I am currently a tenure-track, assistant professor in social psychology at New York University. I was a tenure-track, assistant professor at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio for three years prior to New York University.

In these positions, I have taught Introduction to Psychology numerous times and received excellent teaching evaluations (see last page of vita). In addition, I would be interested in and qualified to teach a course on Self and Social Judgment. This course would describe how people make decisions about themselves and others and how these differences change across cultures, particularly focusing on North America and China. I have taught this course while at New York University and again received exceptionally high teaching evaluations. In addition, I received the most prestigious teaching award offered by the College of Arts and Sciences at Cornell University, where I was teaching while a PhD candidate.

In addition, my specific area of research expertise falls within self and social judgment. I have published many articles on this topic in the most reputable journals in our field. On particular article, published in the *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology*, explores cultural differences in social judgment. Specifically, my research tested differences between Chinese-Americans' and Americans' differing levels of generosity, and their ability to accurately make predictions about their own and others' generosity. I am well qualified to teach courses that focus on social psychological issues pertaining to China and address the program requirements of Summer China.
